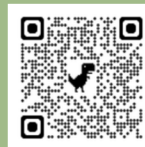

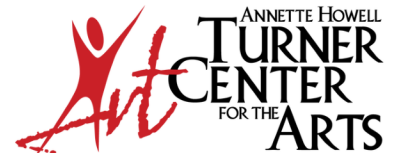
Arts & Culture

- Use smart thermostats - wifi enabled devices that control the heating and cooling of your home.
